

A woman who has lived through two World Wars and 21 prime ministers has celebrated her 104th birthday. Edith Mears, of The Chantry in The Ridgeway, Chingford, reached the milestone on Wednesday. She is thought to be the second oldest woman in the borough, a few weeks behind Grace Chandler from Leytonstone, whose 104th birthday was on April 5. Ms Mears, a retired Bank of England secretary, said the secret to a long life was a "good, healthy diet and the odd sherry on special occasions." She was given flowers and gifts by friends who gathered at the care home. The mother-of-one also saw a surprise vocal performance by Show Boat, a group of ex-West End entertainers. Part-time home manager Maggie Rickard said Ms Mears, a resident of eight years, was on "top form". She added: "Edith is a wonderful, sociable lady. She still has a very good sense of humour."

Children missing from care had left country

Two children missing from care in the borough ran away to try to avoid deportation, the council has revealed.

A request under freedom of information law showed last week that five children were missing after being placed in the care of local authorities.

The council has now said two of the children were in the country illegally and have disappeared.

A further two children are thought to have moved abroad with a parent and one has moved to another part of the

A spokeswoman said the council was a "corporate" parent for the child who remains in the UK, meaning staff should provide as high a standard of

care as they would for their own children. She added: "While we cannot reveal confidential information which may jeopardise the outcome of the case, we can confirm that this young person has voluntarily moved to another part of the country and our work with partners on this case is ongo-

ing."
She added: "Two of the other children have moved abroad with a parent who is a foreign national, and the other two young people are asylum seekers with no leave to remain in the UK who have chosen to abscond to avoid deporta-

Waltham Forest, along with Newham, had the highest number of children missing from care, although 10 boroughs failed

to provide figures.
The London Assembly Liberal Democrats Group called the figures a scandal" after a the documents showed boroughs across London had lost children from their care.

Liberal Democrat councillor Bob Sullivan has called for a full investigation into the "distressing" findings, adding: "However difficult the circumstances, what parent would lose track of their children like this?

"Where was the timely call to the community to help find these children before it was too late?

Waltham Forest council has refused to provide the Guardian with any further information or pictures of the children for a missing persons appeal.
